FROM THE BOARD







Maintaining a Gem

he linear park known as Riverwalk is one of the many treasures in Fort Lauderdale. Not only do we have the beautiful view of the New River. but it also includes the Riverwalk Arts & Entertainment District. On the west end of the Riverwalk is the recently renovated Broward Center for the Performing Arts, which was recognized in Auditoria Magazine's 2016 Annual Report.

Part of the Broward Center renovation included the addition of Huizenga Pavilion, the new two-story event location, which houses Marti's New River Bistro on the first floor and overlooks the Riverwalk. Outside the Huizenga Pavilion is Wendt Terraces, which offers waterfront seating along the New River and alfresco dining. 



Fort Lauderdale Woman's Club (1911), which was formed in 1910 and is owned and operated by the club of the same name. The property abuts Stranahan Park, which contains Fort Lauderdale's only botanical garden. Residing in the downtown Historical District along Riverwalk are the Philemon Bryan House (1914), the King Cromartie House (1907), the New River Inn (1905), and the replica of the School House, all owned by the City of Fort Lauderdale and overseen and managed by the Fort Lauderdale Historical Society. There are other historical structures in our wonderful city and a neighborhood Historical District in Sailboat Bend. Of course we don't want you to miss our beautiful Riverwalk Linear Park along with Huizenga Plaza.

Hidden gems abound in Fort Lauderdale, and with that, a plethora of things to do. Hidden gems also include adventures, so be sure to check our online event calendar for happenings in the Greater Fort Lauderdale area. Hidden Treasures

A TOUR OF DOWNTOWN'S PATH LESS TRAVELED

owntown has long been a hub for some of the region's biggest activities, but the little known gems make the place an offbeat destination too. A great way to explore the city and get to know its quirky offerings is to go by bike, starting from the north along the Flagler Village Greenway. The greenway along the FEC railroad from Sunrise Blvd. to NW Second St. is a lesser-known journey through one of downtown's most interesting neighborhoods. I encourage you to start at Sunrise Blvd. and see the transformation underway in Flagler Village.

The first stop is Radioactive Records (845 N. Federal; (954) 762-9488; www.radio-activerecords.com). In a time of streaming and downloads, this has been a treasured institution that is every music lover's paradise. An event not to be missed here is the annual Record Store Day, held in April, when local bands and vendors celebrate the ever enduring vinyl record.

Back on the greenway, you will find Brew Urban Cafe (537 NW First Ave.; (954) 357-3934), a tucked away coffee spot in FAT Village that's full of atmosphere and great coffee. It's the ideal place to share an intimate conversation or snuggle up with a good book. If you're lucky, you might catch the thrill of a passing train right outside. And pretty soon the Brightline Station will open within walking distance.

Continue on the greenway and cross Broward Blvd., pedaling on to Riverfront. Follow the scent of freshly baked pizza to Las Olas Riverfront Pizza (300 SW First Ave. #106; (954) 522-6556; www. lasolasriverfrontpizza.com). I have been enjoying piping hot pies at this mainstay since it opened here in Riverfront's infancy and before Mike, the owner, was a married father of two! The fact that this pizzeria is the longest running tenant in the complex is a testament to the quality of their pizza. Stop in and sample their many different toppings, delicious calzones, subs, pastas, salads, and garlic knots!

Now, burn off those calories along the Riverwalk and enjoy the lush setting of this famous path. Head west and you will come to Cooley's Landing (450 SW Seventh Ave.). This peaceful and picturesque spot is one of my favorite vantage points in downtown. Cooley's Landing is the perfect place to take a breather and watch the boats go by. It's the kind of place that reminds you of a slower pace of life and why we love it here.

For the intrepid cyclists, pedal over the Marshall Bridge and make a left into the Tarpon River neighborhood. See if you can find The Pirate Republic (400 SW Third Ave.; (954) 761-3500, www.piraterepublicbar.com), another tucked away gem of a restaurant that has a gorgeous waterfront view and lively atmosphere of all things pirate. Be sure to try their delicious mussels in wine sauce, great for dipping your bread in. A great place for happy hour sunsets, this is the perfect spot to toast the end of your expedition.

But this journey barely scratches the surface. There are many other hidden paths and treasures to be found in Downtown Fort Lauderdale - you just have to find them!


THE BEAUTY AND MAGIC OF WATERFRONT SPACES IN FORT LAUDERDALE

This view of Port Evergladesand if you catch it right, a handful of cruise ships—is quintessential Fort Lauderdale and representative of our economic and recreational ties to the water.

Hidden No More!

NAVIGATING CITY STREETS MADE EASIER

ow many of you have been confused about where to park downtown, how to locate your destination, or had someone stop you to ask for directions because they were lost? Coming soon to downtown are exciting initiatives to make it easier to navigate the streets, whether by foot, bike, or vehicle. These efforts include a new wayfinding signage package, more utility boxes wrapped with maps and artistic designs, and a smart parking system.

You have probably seen the cool art wraps popping up throughout downtown on traffic controller boxes. Originally started by the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) as an onion-to-orchid beautification program, the Utility Box Wrap effort has grown and will continue to expand throughout the city. Expect to see approximately 10 more wraps along Broward Blvd. and US-1 in the near future, as well as approximately 25 along A1A in the beach area. Beyond a pretty picture, these wraps start to brand an area and help people familiarize themselves with the surrounding area. Someone recently proposed to meet my staff out in the field and suggested one of the boxes in Flagler Village as the meeting location. Now that's placemaking!

A significant game changer to easy navigation is the replacement of old signs with a family of new wayfinding signs. New signs have been installed in the beach area with more to come this year. Downtown will see about 35 new pedestrian




wayfinding signs before summer, with about 75 new parking, vehicular, and transit signs following soon after. Why make investments into a signage system anyway? Think about your experience when you go to a shopping mall. Not only does exterior signage help you to identify where you should park, but the interior signage helps you navigate to the store of your choice.

No longer will you question where Riverwalk is when you're less than a block away, or how to get to the Broward Center for the Performing Arts or the courthouse. As pedestrian foot traffic continues to increase along with the addition of new housing options and the desire to do business in the urban core, we have to invest in amenities that will make it convenient for people to move around.

While it's important to move people once they are here, it is also important to get people here. For those planning to drive into downtown, a new parking technology is in the works that will provide real time availability of spaces within City-owned garages, parking lots, and on the street. While the deployment date is still to be set, it is definitely in our future and we are excited about the capabilities this technology presents. Sounds like a future article topic!

As we continue to provide a more pedestrianfriendly city, we have to create options for people. Beyond more common transit investments like streetcars, bike facilities, and pedestrian crossings, navigational tools such as wayfinding signage, box wraps, and technology are powerful tools to help build the infrastructure that will support a multimodal way of life. They also help to bring awareness to all the great city destinations and offerings. ⁽¹⁾

The FAB Movement

A LOCAL ART COLLECTOR INVITES FAB! MEMBERS TO AN EXCLUSIVE TOUR

here is an important collection of studio glass, paintings, and unique sculpture located in a beautiful penthouse on our beach. Selected piece-by-piece over many years, the art reflects the passion and taste of a collector, who wishes to remain unknown. For the first Funding Arts Broward event of the season, FAB! members were treated to a private tour of a selection of studio glass that dazzled with the morning beach sunlight. While learning about the history of the American Glass Movement, colleagues and fellow art connoisseurs experienced art, and more art.

FAB! members gain access to events not readily open to the public, affording them sneak peeks into some of the private dynamics of art collecting, special performances and exhibitions, back stage tours at Broward Center for the Performing Arts and other South Florida performance venues, and tours of Art Basel. FAB!'s hope is for its members to become arts ambassadors by funding local arts organizations through grants, educating themselves through on-site tours, and developing intellectual friendships. "We call it FRIENDraising, and it's a powerful combination," says board member Jessica Olfeson.

As part of the first exclusive tour of the season, members were also treated to a short history about the beginnings of studio glass in America, inspired by Harvey K. Littleton during the late 1950s. This later became known as the American Glass Movement of 1962. Littleton organized an inaugural seminar at the Toledo Museum as part of a series of glass blowing workshops in March and June of 1962. Littleton subsequently

started a glass program at the University of Wisconsin, and some of his earliest students were Dale Chihuly, Marvin Lipofsky, and Fritz Dreisbach, all artists who played seminal roles in promoting studio glass around the world.

The story of our art collector goes back more than 30 years when she was looking for a centerpiece for a coffee table. Her search led her to a gallery in West Palm Beach. "That one centerpiece has now grown through the years into a major collection of studio glass," says her friend and designer, who has spent years creating the architectural backdrop for this unique collection.

This personal collection has developed over time. The owner says, "I will eventually donate it to important museums. I am passionate about this art and have developed my collection through my own personal taste." Her taste, says her designer, reveals a fantastic eye for unique pieces from traditional to contemporary studio glass.



THE NUMBERS BEHIND FORT LAUDERDALE'S BEACH RE-NOURISHMENT PROJECT

t has taken nearly 20 years of permitting to begin our nearly five miles of coastline beach restoration at a price of \$10 million per mile. This is critical for environmental and economic reasons. The sand, trucked in from LaBelle, will protect roads and buildings from the powerful Atlantic Ocean. The sand-starved coastline, from Pompano Beach to Fort Lauderdale, will also host over 14 million visitors, spending more than \$11.4 billion in Broward County's economy.

Our beaches attract 7.2 million visitors a year, spending \$422 million annually. According to the Broward County government, beaches contribute \$548 million to the local economy. In fact, for every 85 visitors, one job in Broward is supported. According to a study by the State of Florida, for every dollar spent on beach re-nourishment, \$5 is returned to our economy. That means our current spending has an estimated economic impact of \$255 million.

The price of bringing new sand to our 24 miles of coastline has increased dramatically over the years.

The last major project for just over six miles of restoration had a price tag of \$24 million, 54 percent less than the current project.

Funding of these projects continues to be a challenge. The county receives \$54 million in bed tax revenues collected at hotels at a rate of five percent. It uses a portion of those proceeds to fund its share of beach restoration. State and federal governments support projects, too. The federal government just paid after many years with the county fronting the money.

Cities are also asked through interlocal agreements to contribute. The problem is that they don't have a dedicated funding source for this like the bed tax controlled by the county.

Once the Pompano Beach to Fort Lauderdale project is completed, we will focus on what is known as the Sand Bypass project and Segment III. The Sand Bypass project basically collects accumulated sand at the Port Everglades jetty and transports it south. Segment III runs from John U. Lloyd Park to Hallandale.

What is clear is that we will be required to replenish sand on a regular basis to maintain our world class, top beach destination. How we are going to pay for it going forward will continue to be debated.





Known for being dog friendly, Snyder Park is made up of 93 acres near the Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport. Within the past few years, the park has attracted animals of the insect variety with a small butterfly garden, in which you'll find an assortment of greenery – like milkweeds and pentas plants – and a poster board to help you identify butterflies in the area. A library stand is at the east end, in keeping with the park's aim to attract youths to the outdoors.



ANNIE BECK PARK

You might not notice it when driving on N. Victoria Park Road. At the bottom of the slope on the east side winds Annie Beck Park. Just north of NE First St. sits the park sign and dedication plaque. It was named in 1976 after Annie Beck, a woman who helped establish the Fort Lauderdale Garden Club years after she first came to live in the area in 1916. The park pathway is bordered by water lapping against the protruding roots and overhanging gumbo limbos and oaks. It's ideal for walking or jogging, and, when you find a clearing in the trees, sightseeing and bird watching. You might even see a kayaker paddling by.

Sandwiched between Solmar Apartments and NE Third Ave., Peter Feldman Park is a small piece of land. You can trace its boundaries with a cursory glance but it's significant to those who live nearby. A colorful playground sits at the south side, and, at the center, a green mound of grass is encircled by sidewalk and dotted with benches. Nearby residents can be seen walking their dogs or eating at one of the picnic tables on the park's east end. Just a short walk from the downtown core, it's a nice, underutilized spot for a downtown professional's midday lunch break.






SECRET WOODS NATURE CENTER

A little road off State Road 84, with trees on both sides, leads you to the Secret Woods. The nature center is the first of its kind among Broward County Parks. Its origins date back to 1971 when the owner of the neighboring Rolly Marine Service, Inc. was seeking additional space for the marina. For that he needed the land rezoned for commercial use. Some local residents wouldn't have it. After much publicity via a Miami Herald reporter, who also coined the term "secret woods," and clamor from conservationists and residents, it was decided that the land would remain as it was. In 1978 the park officially opened. Roger Clark, a ranger at the center says they focus a lot on education. An exhibit hall hosts a mural of Stranahan House, live reptiles, video interactions, and clothes for a children's dress-up station, and events like eco-action days, and naturalist-led hikes aim to educate those of all ages. Clark says, "We're trying to preserve Old Florida as much as we can." The butterfly island and two trails that weave through the 57-acre property showcase mangroves, cypress trees, big oaks, and giant land crabs.

They started the venture in July 2014 in a warehouse space off Andrews Ave. In addition to roasting coffee beans on site, the pair hosts monthly workshops featuring in house coffee tastings and discussions on how to brew coffee at home. Last summer during a Flagler Village Art Walk, Argyle Coffee Roasters hosted the first South Florida Coffee Community Festival, where between 300 and 400 people were educated on the art of coffee making. They hope to do the same this year. They also host weekly open hours, on Saturdays between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Stop by for a cup, hangout with the owners, learn more about what you're drinking, and get your coffee supply for the week. THE COOKIE SHOP

It's a bit of a trek from Downtown Fort Lauderdale and it may take you a little while to find, but once you enter this neighborhood staple, you'll feel like you've come home to grandma's baking. The smells are intoxicating and locals and visitors agree. Julie, who owns the shop with her husband John, bakes cookies, pies, cakes, lemon squares, macaroons, and more daily. Most of the time, they sell out. But not to worry, Julie bakes and replenishes all day. Friday is Pie Day – apple, rhubarb, coconut custard, blueberry, pumpkin, key lime, chocolate – the desserts are \$12 each (except for rhubarb, which is \$15). Chocolate chip cookies are in demand daily. Julie says her customers travel from Orlando and Miami to buy baked goods and that some of her regular families have been coming to the Cookie Shop for four generations. Heads up – you might want to bring cash. Most of the cookies are \$3.50 to \$4 a dozen and if you're using a card, there's a \$10 minimum. Do the math. Ten dollars buys you a lot of cookies.

Formerly called The Keg on Sixth, Riverside Market South took over the space in the airport district last July. With about 300 bottled beers available and 32 beers on tap it's not hard to tell it's the sister location of the well-known Riverside Market in Sailboat Bend. The menu features the usual bar food – hamburgers, pizza, wings, and shareable plates like chips and salsa, a hummus platter, and jalapeño poppers. The décor is unique to the place. All the trimmings were brought in by Riverside Market, including a mural on the north wall made entirely out of duct tape.

Tucked away off Las Olas Blvd. next to a realty office and a pet salon, Kavasutra has been serving the popular kava elixir for two and a half years. It's a place for regulars who are familiar with the drink's professed abilities. Kava is made from a South Pacific root and is known for its relaxing properties. Manager and bartender Matt Salley says the owner liked the culture of Las Olas but wanted to be set apart from the hustle and bustle. To combat the effects of having a secluded location, they host events about every two months featuring drink specials, different DJs, and hopefully soon, live music. Order kava in varying doses depending on your tolerance and how many friends you bring with you. The Kratom, which isn't on the paper menu, is made from a leaf found in Thailand and is supposed to be a natural energy drink. It's available bottled.

In the spot formerly known as Eucalyptus Gardens off NE 13 Ave. east of the tracks, this is an oasis in more ways than one. Owner Matias Jurgeit was a bartender and mixologist in Miami, but after 12 years, South Beach became too overwhelming for him. He wanted to reinvent himself in a setting surrounded by nature and serenity. His coffee bar/ restaurant addresses both. Although the spot is set back from a main thoroughfare, he likes it that way. He says it goes with the concept. "You're transported to a different place." No street sounds or traffic. His inspiration touches virtually everything in the shop – he made the bar at the window out of the steps from the old orchid house next door. It looks like a laboratory behind the bar, which features Jurgeit's own water system. "It's going back to basics," he says. That's why they call him the alchemist. As is the location, the menu is unconventional. It features The Alchemists' Bulletproof, which is their brewed coffee with organic coconut oil and ghee, and a 24-hour cold brew, which they use to make iced coffee and coffee iced cubes. Order a cup, sit outside, study, or even grab a bite. Their open-faced sandwiches on Tuscan bread are known as slicers.

Four ways to rediscover your neighborhood

- Take a different path on your way home, to the grocery store or to work, take a different route. You may discover a more scenic way or a place you've never been before.
- Talk to locals ask a mounted police officer, a Riverwalk ambassador, or the security ambassadors that patrol the Riverwalk. They can give you more information about area attractions.
- Walk sometimes we miss things when we're in a car. Walking through a neighborhood can provide a different perspective and help you notice more subtleties.

The bounty might not be in plain sight, but once you've found it, sign the logbook and leave the stash exactly as you found it. You can tally your finds on the site. It's geocaching without the technology crutch. Learn about the community under pressure, canvassing the city with your team, assessing clue after clue. The Salvation Army Fort Lauderdale hosts the MOST Amazing Race, an annual scavenger hunt for teams of two all in the name of raising money for the charity. This year, it'll be on April 30 at 7 a.m. and just like the reality television show, it'll feature checkpoints, clues, and various modes of travel - participants have to get around on foot or via Broward County Transit. The charter company, which was also in on the ruse, presented Alana with four possible dates for the excursion, which were really provided by Kevin to ensure that she





TIME BETWEEN FORT LAUDERDALE AND NAPA, SHARING A

LOVE OF WINE AND NOW THEIR OWN VINEYARD





n the early 90s, Neil Ellman discovered his passion for wine and promised himself he would one day own his own vineyard. About 15 years later, Neil, and his brother Lance, founded Ellman Family Vineyards, where business and family are fused in the most tasteful of ways.

The Ellman brothers, born in Durban, South Africa and raised in Fort Lauderdale, have always been a pair. After college, they joined their third generation family-owned mattress manufacturing business, helping to grow it to one of the largest in the United States. After selling the business in the early 2000s, the brothers were in need of a new challenge.

"Neil and I are very close," Lance says. "Anything we do, we do together, including business. When Neil started to get more into wine, it definitely rubbed off on me and our passion grew together."

The brothers live with their wives and children in Fort Lauderdale, but in 2005, they ventured to California to start their wine business. For more than 10 years, they partnered with a wine maker to produce a few hundred cases a year while searching for the perfect vineyard to call home, one that could serve as both a winery and a second family residence.

"It took many years to find a property," Neil says. "This past spring we found the perfect location in Napa. When we saw it we knew it was a winner. It's nearly 15 acres."

They travel to California between six and eight times a year and produce about 1,000 cases of wine annually. They make a variety of wines, including Pinot Noirs, Proprietary Red Blends, and Sauvignon Blancs, but say Cabernets are their production's main focus.

"There [are] lots of ways to make wine," Lance says. "There [are] ways to take short cuts and cut costs, but we don't do that. It's not as much about the financial side compared to producing the type of wine we want for ourselves and to share with our friends."

The Ellman's wines can be found in select restaurants in Fort Lauderdale, including Casa de Angelo, Steak 954, 3030 Ocean at Harbor Beach Marriott, and other establishments in Florida and California, and retail stores like Wine Watch. The pair says they will always keep their wine personal by avoiding mass production and selling it only in handpicked places.

"I think we're a very select group to purchase from," Lance says. "We want to have relationships with our customers and maintain our high quality."

Though California has become a large part of the Ellman family, Neil and Lance are adamant on Fort Lauderdale remaining home base. "We grew up here, on the waterways and near the beaches," Lance says. "We take full advantage of the lifestyle we have here. Our kids and our [lives] are here too."

"This is a long term play too," Neil adds. "Building this family brand is beyond our generation. This is just the beginning."



A BYGONE STOMPING **GROUND**

FOR MORE THAN HALF A CENTURY, BROWNIE'S WAS A BAR FOR ITS TIME

riving on Andrews Avenue just south of Davie Boulevard, you'll pass by the craft beer gastropub that started turning heads in 2011. Beneath Tap 42's surface, though, is nearly a century's worth of history. More than 80 years ago, the locale known as Brownie's occupied the land. Owned by Brownlow "Brownie" Robertson, it was Fort Lauderdale's oldest bar before it closed in the late 80s.

"He was really into booking bands," Brownie's daughter Susan Gloeckner said. "He realized many places at the time didn't want to book black bands because of segregation issues, but he didn't have a problem with it."

Brownie opened the space in 1935 as the Trianon Ballroom, booking dozens of big bands, with frequent performances by Duke Ellington, Cab Calloway, and Louis Armstrong. Soon after opening, the popularity of big bands started to die down, forcing Brownie to reconsider his space.

"After he stopped booking bands, he tried turning the space into a roller-skating rink but later settled on keeping it as a bar with a package store next door," Gloeckner said.

Club Brownie became the area's go-to bar, with Brownie's main focus on quenching a patron's thirst. "He never had a kitchen in the bar," Gloeckner said. "But he offered free snacks like cheese and peanuts because he thought if people ate something salty, they'd get thirsty and buy more beer."


Most nights, the bar was packed to capacity with about 300 people. He kept a jukebox inside, giving guests the freedom to listen to what they wanted. Gloeckner remembers spending most of her childhood inside the spot, with the bartenders acting as her extended family. "All of the bartenders were like my uncles," Gloeckner said. "He would take care of them, but they had to do their job. One thing he didn't stand for was nonsense."

In the more than 50 years of running Club Brownie, Brownie's Bar, and Brownie's Bar and Liquor Store, Brownie prided himself on keeping the bar violencefree. "He tried to keep that hint of family," she said. "He took pride in never needing to call the cops. And the bartenders knew when to cut people off too. It was really your basic, family-friendly neighborhood bar."

In 1986, Brownie sold the business, but not the land. "He'd been there for 50 years," she said. "It was time to retire. When dad first opened the bar, it was the first of its kind in the area. He did it his way, and he did it well. It was right for that time, but times have changed."

Now Tap 42 rents the property from Brownie's family. "When they first purchased the business, their idea was to fix up the bar inside," Gloeckner said. "But it had really been run down through the years, and it turned into a rebuild instead of a remodel. It became Tap 42 instead of Brownie's."

Brownie's is now a memory, but Gloeckner said she has accepted it. "It was a local neighborhood bar for blue collar workers, but the area isn't like that anymore," she said. "Tap 42 needed to change it. They created a new bar for a new time, just like dad had done for his time." (1)

THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NOVA SOUTHEASTERN UNIVERSITY

CENTER FOR COLLABORATIVE RESEARCH IS THE LATEST PUSH

TOWARDS BROWARD COUNTY BECOMING AN EPICENTER OF

SOUTH FLORIDA'S LIFE SCIENCES INDUSTRY

he life sciences industry is very similar to life itself. In order to live and thrive, the industry, like the human body, needs all the varied systems and resources to be in place and functioning efficiently. Recently, South Florida has come alive as a national leader in the industry. The State of Florida alone ranks eighth in biotech research and development, fourth in clinical trials imitated, third in pharmaceutical and medicine manufacturing, and second for medical device manufacturing. Broward County is poised to become the apex of the South Florida life sciences corridor.

According to the Life Sciences South Florida organization, the region employs over 25,000 people within 1,500 life science businesses and generates roughly \$4 billion in sales. These businesses range in diversity from MAKO Surgical Corp. of Davie that manufactures robotic arms for orthopedic surgery to U.S. Stem Cell in Sunrise that develops novel, regenerative medicine and cellular therapy products.

A tactical combination of educational institutions, research facilities, and public-private funding

opportunities is allowing Broward County to move up the life sciences evolutionary ladder. One institution, and there are many, that exemplifies this evolution is Nova Southeastern University and its Center for Collaborative Research (CCR). Set to open this month on Nova's Davie campus, the CCR is an \$80 million, 215,000 square foot facility.

Dr. H. Thomas Temple, senior vice president of translational research and economic development is responsible for bringing clinical investigators, established research institutes, and private corporations to the center. "My goal is to bring new research funding, scientific investigators that show great promise, and private industry collaboration," he said. "Research is funded through sponsored programs, competitive grants, private industry partnerships, philanthropy and now, more than ever,

Tech transfer is the process of transferring knowledge, research, methodologies, and scientific discoveries into commercially accessible ventures. Thus, NSU could leverage future discoveries with business accelerators or start ups for commercialization in a possible wholly-owned NSU company.

The collection of occupants in the CCR will be impressive. The first floor will house the United States

Geological Survey – of course you want the geological people close to the ground – which will research Everglades restoration. On another floor, NSU's Institute for Neuro-Immune Medicine is researching a variety of diseases ranging from HIV/AIDS to chronic fatigue syndrome and the effects of toxins on the immune system that ultimately have neurological consequences.

Cancer research, a key focus for NSU and the CCR, will be housed in the NSU Cell Therapy Institute. Efforts will be focused on treating cancers, heart disease, and disorders causing blindness. NSU is partnering with Sweden's world-renowned medical and research center Karolinska Institute in this endeavor. The institute is responsible for awarding the Nobel Prize in physiology and medicine.

The Rumbaugh-Goodwin Institute for Cancer Research, which recently received a \$1 million donation from AutoNation CEO Mike Jackson and his wife Alice, will also be involved in collaboration within the building.

To further the medical interactions on campus, NSU has expanded its educational offerings with the creation of the College of Allopathic Medicine, which will offer MD degrees along with their current College of Osteopathic Medicine. In addition, NSU has partnered with the Hospital Corporation of America – East Florida to become a medical system and a leader in healthcare innovation in South Florida.

Temple explained, "We want to be at the intersection of the health sciences, business, and research in a very innovative way. We could possibly create a novel idea or treatment in the CCR or other centers around campus and we could plug those ideas into a hospital or medical center for a clinical trial or with a business accelerator for commercial development. This way we will be able to answer questions in months not years." He added, "The wonderful thing about Nova Southeastern University is we are not following a script of what others have done. We are writing our own script."

At the physical crossroads of I-95, 595, and the Florida Turnpike, NSU and the CCR are slated to be an epicenter of the life sciences industry. ⁽¹⁾



A Restauranteur's Legacy

THE MONTREAL CLASSIC THURSDAY'S COMES TO LAS OLAS

ay "bonjour" to Thursday's Fort Lauderdale. This new restaurant at the east end of the Las Olas retail area is a welcomed addition to the culinary flavors that continue to grow and develop in Downtown Fort Lauderdale. This newcomer is owned by long time businessman and restauranteur Bernard Ragueneau, who first opened a small bar in Canada in 1968. He recently relocated from Montreal, Canada to South Florida to retire with his wife Arlene. Bernard is not your typical retiree. Even with his daughter and Thursday's co-owner Savannah managing the restaurant's operations, he remains very hands on at the restaurant daily.

When you walk into the dining area, you can't help but be stunned by the two huge, glistening chandeliers that hang above the tables. People walking by often stop and come in just to take pictures of them. The chandeliers, like the furniture and other aspects of décor (with the exception of the bar and floor), were brought from their sister restaurant, Thursday's in Montreal, after it was remodeled. Even without having been to the other location, you get a nostalgic feeling as you look around. The transporting of all of the materials and the build out of what used to be two Las Olas storefronts took Bernard a year to complete.





Savannah describes the menu as, "French-American with a twist." The most popular item on the menu is the steak tartare. Available in a small or sharable portion, each serving is made to order by Bernard himself. In a wooden bowl, he combines minced, lean ground beef, kosher salt, olive oil, and a couple other key ingredients. He works the meat into a circle shape, tops it with scallions, and serves it with endive and crostini. If you don't eat red meat, Thursday's offers a savory salmon tartare, another one of their most popular items, which is also made to order.

On both the lunch and dinner menus, choose from items like French onion soup, Poutine – French fries topped with gravy and cheese curds – and escargot. The French American combination theme continues with the main dishes on the lunch menu, which features the Crouque Monsieur (ham and gruyere), hamburgers, hot dogs, and a seafood salad with shrimp, smoked salmon, and scallops. Main dishes on the dinner menu include vegetable orzotto, Cornish hen crapaudine, Florida grouper, lamb shank, and a bone in ribeye to name a few. At Thursday's, they pride themselves on offering local seafood items and a raw bar that is made up of daily fresh arrivals.

Thursday's is open seven days a week for lunch and dinner and for brunch on Sundays. They also offer happy hour seven days a week at their full service bar. Make a reservation or just walk on in to get a taste of a family-owned operation with a storied past. ©

1 teaspoon of French mustard

1 teaspoon of ketchup

1 tablespoon of canola oil

1 pinch of cayenne pepper

Method:

Add a tablespoon of chopped onions and a touch of salt in a wooden bowl. With two forks with sharp teeth, squash them together until the juice comes out. Next, add an egg yolk, a teaspoon of French mustard, a teaspoon of ketchup, a tablespoon of canola oil and a pinch of cayenne pepper. Mix well. Add in 8 ounces of very lean grounded beef. Form the mixture into a patty shape and display it on a cold plate with decorations of your choosing.

Tartare Fun Fact: The original recipe comes from the Mongols, an ancient people known to be the best riders in the world at their time. They would store their hunting prize under their saddle as they rode. Then, when they were hungry, they would eat the raw and tender meat.

What is your favorite dish to prepare? Steak tartare for sure. I'm very well known for my steak tartare.

What's the story behind the name Thursday's?

In 1968, I opened a restaurant in Montreal called Friday's. It was a very popular place. Then I decided to open another restaurant and I had to make a choice between Saturday and Thursday. I wasn't too crazy about Saturday so I said, 'Let's go for Thursday.' I opened Thursday's in Montreal in 1973, which turned out to be another success story and it's a big operation in Montreal.

What is your favorite ingredient?

I'm French so everything is butter, butter, and butter. But I have to admit that now olive oil is a healthier kind of ingredient.







Nadine Egan Floyd

hen she was a teenager, Nadine Egan Floyd decided that she

didn't want to go into accounting. Her parents were in the field and ever since her mom gifted her with an oil paints set when she was 10-years-old, she knew her future profession would involve art, not numbers.


She did major in art, but now the Broward resident is president of The Media Lab/Power Images, a company she owns with her husband. "For the last 30 years what have I been doing? Bookkeeping and networking. So, never say never." Still, art doesn't take second place. It's a balance she has come to know well and enjoy.

During her self-prescribed time off, the witty New Jersey native spends hours in her studio. "I've got to feed that art part of me. I think any artist has to," she says. "When I go in my studio and really get into it, the left brain turns off and the right brain turns on, which is so much nicer." That could mean a number of things for Floyd. Currently, her preferred medium is glass. But jewelry is and has always been a constant.

She gains inspiration from ongoing trends and a less current source – ancient jewelry designs displayed at the Metropolitan

Museum of Art. Byzantine, Egyptian, Viking styles – Floyd says jewelry designs haven't changed much. Techniques have reverberated through history.

Her other works – paintings, sculptures, and painted glass pieces – are on display on her website and in the North Beach Gallery in Fort Lauderdale and the Native



Colors Gallery in Key West. Last December, she hand painted glass ornaments for Stranahan House before gearing up to enter Bonnet House Impressions 2016, the museum's juried art competition. She says her favorite piece is the painted sailfish sculpture in Esplanade Park, which she did as part of an art in public places project. ⁽¹⁾
