et ready ... the Fort Lauderdale St. Patrick's Parade and Festival is back on March 9! While many popular features will be returning, there are some new changes to get acquainted with. Every year we strive to make the event bigger and better than the last and this year is no exception.

# OUR INSTITUTED GOALS: AUTHENTIC IRISH AND FAMILY

The name of the event has changed slightly to Fort Lauderdale St. Patrick's Parade and Festival, omitting the "Day" to account for the event not occurring on the actual holiday. In years past there has been some confusion as to why the event does not take place on St. Patrick's Day or the day before. My goal has always been that the economic return of the event for the Downtown business community is greater when it occurs the week before. That way the event does not detract from the business our bars and restaurants enjoy on the actual holiday every year. # O NEW PARADE ROUTE AND STAGING

This is perhaps the biggest change to the event. This year the parade will begin on Las Olas Boulevard and Southeast Fifth Avenue in front of the SunTrust Center building and continue west along Las Olas, past Andrews Avenue and through the Las Olas Riverfront's Brickell Avenue, ending at Southwest Second Street. Staging will occur at three separate locations according to parade group type. Ornate floats will be staged on Las Olas Boulevard between Kinney Tunnel and Southeast Eighth Avenue. Groups that will be walking or biking will stage on Southeast Fifth Avenue between Southeast Second Street and Las Olas. Groups in cars and other motorized vehicles will stage along North New River Drive East, entering the queue in between the Las Olas Riverhouse and 200 East Las Olas. Each group will be ushered into the parade at Southeast Fifth Avenue and Las Olas, where all the fun begins.

# New Way to Give to the Arts

Benefactors May Support Broward Arts Groups Through New Website

his February, a new website will launch designed to address changing trends in philanthropy and the arts. Business for the Arts of Broward introduces www. power2give.org/broward - an online fundraising platform to support arts and cultural projects in Broward County. The site will offer a unique way for individuals and corporations to make donations to artistic projects of nonprofit cultural organizations.

Through this interactive, user-friendly website, arts and cultural organizations will list needs for specific projects for example, instruments for children in a youth orchestra or costumes for an upcoming theater production. Donors can select a need they may be passionate about, and make a donation from as little as \$5 to as large as they wish - helping to bridge the gap between those who wish to give and those who need the support, bringing the «ommunity together.

Business for the Arts of Broward; launch has been made possible with a \$75,000 investment from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, as part of its Knight Arts Challenge, and a \$25,000 investment from Broward County Cultural Division. "This is a unique new funding source for nonprofit arts and cultural organizations," said Jody Horne-Leshinsky, Interim Director Broward Cultural Division. "We hope that organizations and artists will forge collaborations that pique the interest of individuals and corporations who want to support the arts."

Broward-based organizations that have been recommended for funding from the Broward Cultural Council over the last five years, have 501(c)(3) non-profit status and a solicitation license from the State of Florida, can submit cultural arts projects in need of funding up to \$10,000. Organizations posting projects will have 90 days to reach their fundraising goal, but will receive all funds raised, up to \$10,000 even if they don't reach their goal. Money raised will be matched up to \$10,000, thereby compounding the impact of the donations.

"There are a lot of noteworthy projects in Broward County that are in need of direct support," said Jarett S. Levan, chair of Business for the Arts of Browand. "By donating to projects, coupled with a gift from the Knight Foundation, donors can turn specific needs into realities."

The website power2give.org has had tremendous results in other markets. In Charlotte, N.C., the Arts & Science Council raised \$1 million in less than nine months. Other markets that have had success include Kentucky and Southern Indiana, which has raised \$381,709; Miami, \$231,384; and Greensboro, N.C., \$19,383.

"The overwhelming success of power2give.org/Kentucky is directly related to the public-p-ivate partnership created by the Fund for the Arts with Republic Bank, Kentucky Arts Council, LG&E and KU, Stites & Harbison and UPS," said Louisville Fund for the Arts President Barbara Sexton Smith. The success comes from more than 3,750 individual donations and matching gifts from corporations and foundations.

Business for the Arts of Broward is a not-for-profit 501(c) (3) engaging businesses and business leaders to advocate and educate about the importance of the county's arts and cultural community as well as to recognize the connection between cultural vitality, creative success, and economic development.

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

# **New Beginnings**

Riverwalk Provides Perfect Backdrop for Wedding

Picture this: a couple's new beginning against a backdrop of lush landscape and the calm of a slowly floating waterway in the midst of a bustling city. Getting married on the Riverwalk allows brides and grooms to maintain a sense of tradition that can be easily outfit with their own personal touch.

With a choice of four gazebos along the New River, the wedding site prices start at \$150/\$225 (Conne Hoffman, Riverwalk South and Rotary gazebos) and \$400/\$600 (Esplanade pavilion) for residents and non-residents respectively. The areas are available anywhere between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m. on the allotted date and can be booked as little as a week before.

'We had so much funtogether and we laughed so much," Maureen remembers. "At the time, would I say that I was infatuated? Absolutely."



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# A Brick Story



Really, a Love Story, Told Through Riverwalk Bricks

ifteen years ago, Craig Mondo proposed to his wife with a few unconventional items — a Jerry Garcia Beanie Baby, a strollalong the Riverwalk ... and an engraved brick.

In fact, he used a series of engraved bricks to propose to Jill McElhinny. Of course, she said yes, and even responded with an emphatic brick of her own. Their bricks are among the 131 paving the Riverwalk that have the word "marry" on them and are the ones you see on the cover of this issue of Go Riverwalk Magazine.

Since Riverwalk Fort Lauderdale first starting selling bricks as a way to raise funds to improve and maintain this two-raile ribbon along the New River in Downtown, the foundation has sold and placed more than 40,000 bricks. The first brick listed in Riverwalk Fort Lauderdale's database dates to Nov. 1, 1989.

Back in 1997, Craig and Jill lived in Fort Lauderdale and the Riverwalk was a favorite haunt on jazz concert Sundays. Sowhat better way to propose? Craig planned ahead and ordered the series of bricks that reads "Will You Marry Me?" complete with arrows pointing to the next brick. He inserted the engagement ring in the Beanie Baby, placed it

on the proposal bricks and asked his parents to hide out in nearby bushes to keep an eye on things. Meanwhile, Craig and Jill, unaware, strolled along the walk, only to "discover" the proposal for all to see.

A few months later, Jill ordered abrick of her own with her answer. And just last year, the family added to the family's Fort Lauderdale story with bricks from their sons Jonny and Matthew, now 13 and 10, which read "Thanks for saying yes, Mom!" and "Love, Jonny and Matthew."

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
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
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### ... Into The Fort Lauderdale Fire And Safety Museum



ne of the best-hidden gems in the City is the Fort Lauderdale: Fire and Safety Museum, located in the heart of historic Sailboat Bend. Built in 1927, the once active Fire Station 3 has been transformed into a museum used for tours, educational programs and also can be rented for meetings and specials events.

The museum highlights the 100 years of the Fort Lauderdale Fire Rescue Department and the major fires and emergencies that challenged the City through the years. Legend has it you may even spot a ghost or two while visiting the museum.

"The Fire Museum is a dream come true!" said Lieutenant John Heiser, Museum President. "This project came to fruition with support from the citizens of Fort Lauderdale, its business owners and Fort Lauderdale firefighters. We keep moving forward with help from public donations, putting together one of the finest children's fire safety programs and historical firefighting museums anywhere."

The Fire and Safety Museum has been home tc many children's birthday parties throughout recent years. Special packages are available which can include an appearance by Sparky the Fire Dog, a visit by the active For: Lauderdale fire rescue department and engine, and food provided by the museum's sponsor and official caterer, Firehouse Subs.

For adults, the museum can be rented by individuals, businesses and organizations for meetings, lectures, parties or events, as it seats 50 people comfortably in lecture style or table seating. The space has a projection screen, digital audio system, DVD player and connections for a PowerPoint presentation and karaoke machine for those who want to add some pizzazz to their event. The museum is also the perfect site for intimate weddings as the outdoor lawn offers to the perfect backdrop for your special day.

During the school year, the museum hosts dozens of Broward County's public and private school children in its Children's Fire Safety Learning Center. This fast-paced, energetic program teaches young people how to prevent


fires and what to do if one happens. This program is also open to scouting and other children's groups with advance arrangements.

n 1994, this mural was installed on the support of the Andrews Avenue Bridge on the north side of the New River. Fort Lauderdale artist Beverly Crist designed the mural, created from a mosaic of tiles in 15 colors. It was the second enhancement along the Riverwalk donated by Riverwalk Fort Lauderdale foundation.

In December 2013, Riverwalk will celebrate its 25th anniversary. To commemorate the occasion, each month Go Riverwalk Magazine will showcase one of the many public enhancements that has been made along the two-mile stretch of brick walkway along the New River in Downtown Fort Lauderdale.

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
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
