






















A Time of Thanks and **Giving**



Our Downtown Ghosts

EXPLORING PUBLIC SPACES PAST. PRESENT, AND FUTURE

t's that time of year again when the days get shorter, holiday decorations start to go up, and many of us stop and wonder — where did the year go? Here at the DDA it was spent making a better Downtown for the many businesses, residents, visitors, and future downtowners we have yet to meet. And a major focus of improvement has been on public spaces.

In September we saw parking spaces transformed into parks on Park(ing) Day. This annual project lets us reimagine that tiny piece of space as something nicer for the enjoyment of many and not just temporary storage for cars. It's important to stop and explore what our public spaces could be. So in the spirit of the impending holidays, I've looked to Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" for a little inspiration.


The Ghost of Christmas Past visited Scrooge to remind him of past blunders and to make future amends. In Downtown Fort Lauderdale we have the ghosts of public spaces past to remind us of what worked and what didn't when it comes to designing the public realm. For starters, there's the DDA's own Huizenga Plaza. The ghost of this public space past was the Old Governor's Hotel, then a parking lot, and then it became a sandy patch of grass with palm trees.

Similarly, the ghost of Riverwalk used to be a series of parking lots that lined the river. Another ghost of public spaces past is Stranahan Park. Originally this was a swamp, evidenced by its majestic cypress trees. In recent history it was a somewhat generic park. Now it shines with the addition of a beautiful botanical garden and elegant pond.

The ghosts of public spaces present haunt Downtown

with current challenges and potential greatness for the future. While technically a public space, the Federal Courthouse is one most of us hope we'll never have to enter. This space haunts Downtown with an outdated building and unused water fountain. It's something the DDA actively seeks to overhaul through a Public Private Partnership.

Alternatively, the new Broward County Courthouse has been rebuilt with pedestrians in mind, with wide sidewalks and an inviting breezeway. Other public places like the One Stop Shop property and the Central Bus Terminal present promising opportunities as leaders seek to balance future plans with present challenges.

In "A Christmas Carol," the Ghost of Christmas Future presents a bleak scenario if the status quo prevails — Tiny Tim dies and the spirit of Christmas is diminished. In the Downtown narrative, the pedestrian could be viewed as Tiny Tim, since that is who is most vulnerable in the Downtown environment and who represents its lifeblood.

Without pedestrian activity there is no vibrancy. Just as Tiny Tim's death makes Scrooge change his ways, dead public spaces prompt Downtown leaders to plan better ones instead of places where no one wants to be — without the comforts of shade, benches to sit on, no landscaping, no people-watching. Just as Scrooge learned from the stories of the three ghosts, so must we learn from three "ghosts" of Downtown public spaces.

As we plan for a new gateway to the Las Olas shopping district, a new federal courthouse, a new mobility hub, and a redesign of Huizenga Plaza, the public must be the focus of public space. @

MOVING US FORWARD ON THE MIAMI TO ORLANDO LINE

Downtown Fort Lauderdale will soon have a new state-of-the-art passenger rail system operating on the Florida East Coast Railway located right in the heart of the city.

All Aboard Florida is constructing a high-speed intercity rail service between Miami and Orlando with a stop in Fort Lauderdale. The service will begin operating in 2016 between Miami and West Palm Beach with a connection from West Palm Beach to Orlando anticipated to be completed in 2017.

The project will be the nation's first modern, privately financed and owned intercity passenger rail system in more than 30 years.

The Fort Lauderdale station will be located next to the Florida East Coast Railway tracks just north of Broward Boulevard. "It's hard to think of an area that is more geared to transit-oriented development. The bus terminal is there. The Wave station will be there. You can't get any more transit-centric than that," said Fort Lauderdale City Manager Lee Feldman.

The city has been working closely with All Aboard Florida to implement plans to construct the station. Focus has been on creating an iconic station that will connect seamlessly with the surrounding areas, allow for future development, and accommodate the proposed Tri-Rail Costal Link, which is a planned commuter rail service that is anticipated to have stops in most cities along the tracks.

At the unveiling of the station plans earlier this summer, Mayor John P. "Jack" Seiler said, "This is an exciting day for the City of Fort Lauderdale. All Aboard Florida's station will be an ideal complement to the forward-thinking transportation initiatives and development we have planned for our city and it aligns with our 'Fast Forward Fort Lauderdale' vision."

Dialogue with the public, and specifically marine industry representatives, continues to occur to ensure that one of our region's key economic drivers is protected as the train comes to town. Even as these discussions evolve, it's clear that the benefits of this endeavor are numerous.

First, All Aboard Florida will provide a new, affordable and convenient mode of transportation that doesn't exist today in the state. Residents, tourists and business travelers will have the option to board a train rather than drive to Miami or fly to Orlando. Trains will be equipped with Wi-Fi, flexible seating, food and beverage service, and luggage accommodations. Finally, you can relax or work rather than drive.

Second, the station will spur redevelopment Downtown. Vacant and underutilized properties will be prime for new development that emphasizes access to transit and could contain mixed-use programs with housing, retail, hotel, restaurant and office spaces that support walkability.

Third, there will be job creation. Initially, jobs will come directly from construction and then subsequently, employment opportunities. According to the findings of an economic impact study prepared for the project, rail-line construction is expected to create almost 500 jobs, while construction related to future transit oriented



development will create more than 300 jobs.

Fourth, the economic impact on the city and county will be significant. According to the same economic impact study, All Aboard Florida will add nearly \$80.4 million in gross domestic product to Broward County's economy in addition to \$54.8 million in labor income and over \$15 million in tax revenues for federal, state and local governments from rail construction in Broward County alone.

Fifth is the overall long-term environmental benefit to the community. Reducing the number of cars on the local and regional roadway network will result in a decrease in the amount of greenhouse gas emissions entering our environment. The service will mostly operate on an existing rail corridor and the passenger trains will run on diesel-electric locomotive technology producing fewer emissions than traditional methods.

I encourage you to stay tuned into this project as it is one of the most significant efforts to transform the way we move in South Florida. Shhh! Quiet!

ALL QUIET ALONG THE FLORIDA EAST COAST RAILWAY

oon, life will become a bit quieter for neighbors and businesses in Fort Lauderdale. The city has been working with regional partners to designate a quiet zone along the Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway in Broward County. A quiet zone allows a segment of the rail line to operate without the sounding of locomotive horns. All safety measures such as crossing gates and other engineering solutions, which reduce access to the tracks when a train is passing, must be certified by the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) before a quiet zone can be designated.

Without a quiet zone designation, sounding of locomotive horns would be required for a minimum of 15 seconds during the train's approach to a road crossing.

Locomotive horns range between 96-110 decibels, comparable to a rock concert or a jet engine! Noise



Safety improvements will include installation of four-quadrant gates or non-traversable medians.

• A four-quadrant gate has mechanisms on both sides of the tracks to block both directions of automotive traffic. Four-quadrant gates block traffic from navigating around a single gate and reduce risk at a crossing by 82 percent.



· A non-traversable

median extends 60 to 100 feet from crossing gates, preventing vehicles from navigating around two quadrant gates. Non-traversable medians reduce risk at a crossing by 80 percent.


The city has been working with the Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization and All Aboard Florida to identify where, what, and how to fund these safety improvements.

In Fort Lauderdale, 10 out of 21 rail crossings will be upgraded with quiet zone safety improvements. Additionally, five crossings will be upgraded with pedestrian safety improvements, including sidewalks and pedestrian gates. Estimated quiet zone and pedestrian safety improvements will cost approximately \$1.3 million.

Even with these important safety improvements, individuals need to practice safe crossing behaviors to reduce the risk of an accident, including:

- Avoid stopping vehicles on the railway. Remain behind the white line at stoplights until the light turns green and you can safely proceed forward.
- If the crossing gates begin closing, do not attempt to beat or navigate around the gates. The train will pass in less than one minute!
- Pedestrians and bicyclists should look both ways before crossing the tracks. If a train is coming, back away from the tracks until the train passes.
- Use common sense and understand that stopping a train is difficult. Avoid risky behavior and always look both ways.

Construction on safety improvements is anticipated to begin in the summer of 2015 and the city anticipates the ceasing of train horns by early 2016.

ALTERNATIVE WORK ENVIRONMENTS
APPEAL TO THE EVOLVING BUSINESS
OWNER

s a Fort Lauderdale native focused on helping to set the course for our downtown's future, I have always been excited by the unexpected evolutions that sometimes happen as a result of demographic shifts and technology advances. Once, business was tethered to hardline phones and workstations driven by room size, but today that has all changed.

With downtown Fort Lauderdale's skyline maturing with more modern buildings, elegant residential projects and edgy mixed-use loft development, we are seeing a new evolution in workspaces as well. As I write from the 15th floor of a Class A office tower overlooking the heart of the Riverwalk district, I am just a short walk from the top law firms and corporate offices that have traditionally

As in all vibrant communities, Fort Lauderdale benefits from the positive tension between the "button-down" work accomplished in offices high above the streetscape and the on-the-fly world of deal making at coffee shops, incubators and co-working spaces. Today, emerging tech entrepreneurs in rolled up sleeves and sneakers huddle with couture-clad execs to bring ideas and capital together with fantastic results. Here in Fort Lauderdale things are emerging quickly. Just check out the excitement that surrounds Fat Village. It's entirely nontraditional and has seen a complete shift in the past 15 years.

We all understand that Starbucks is the new office away from home with comfortable, easy to find locations and free Wi-Fi. Standard executive offices now offer all the administrative and technology horsepower of Fortune 500 organizations but on a much smaller scale. South Florida is rapidly transitioning beyond the casual spaces where angel investors and hotshot entrepreneurs operate to a completely different way of doing business.

One example is Axis Space, a new and innovative alternative workspace here in Fort Lauderdale. With a collaborative space approach that encompasses four floors overlooking the New River, Axis Space has all the creative touches Silicon Valley techies have come to expect - and demand - in order to successfully bring concepts to life. With exciting residential projects coming online in our urban core, the new breed of downtown dwellers are drawn to this style of workspace. As a kind of open source, bricks and mortar venue where innovative idea cultivation merges with old -school hard work, this kind of approach is sure to spark the establishment of other spaces like it within our downtown. It also might enable startups to confidently launch alongside the proven, established companies that form the foundation of our regional economy.

Really, it is all about making connections between the new creative class that is driving an up and coming, innovative segment of our economic ecosystem and the established business leaders that provide stability for our community — and the places those connections happen. It is exciting to see this type of flexible, communal office space with big pipe connectivity and bright, open areas becoming a hot downtown alternative. It's not for everyone, but for those who thrive in a less structured environment, a fun vibe is part of the package. ©

he next time you watch a blockbuster in the Museum of Discovery and Science AutoNation IMAX Theater, the seats will feel a little cushier, the sounds will be clearer and the screen will seem brighter - bigger even.

Since the end of August and for all of September, children's laughter and museum sounds were joined by construction noise. If you poked your head around the corner near the information booth and snack counter you would have seen a small construction site by the theater entrance.

In with the new and out with the old – a five-story, 4,800 square foot IMAX screen replaced the existing 22-year-old screen, there since the museum opened in 1992. This new display is the same size as its predecessor but because of its positioning and shape, it appears larger.

The theater remodel started after summer camps ended and began with a ripping out of the old hardware – theater seats were donated and the screen was disposed of. A deep cleaning, audio renovations and new seat installation followed.

"We had to bring our technology up to date," said Kim Cavendish president and CEO of the museum. "It's something we've been thinking about for a number of years."

These days, most movies are shown digitally. MODS incorporated new digital surround sound and digital projection systems but retained its original 15/70 film projector, which now is virtually obsolete, but still valuable. Christopher Nolan, director



of the 2014 sci-fi movie, "Interstellar," requested that it be shown on film. MODS, unlike many other venues, will still be able to do that.

The complete shift to digital has been hinted at in the recent past, Cavendish said, but only lately have changes in the industry mandated that digital capabilities be required to show movies.

The theater is now one of three Certified Giant Screen locations in Florida – the other two are in Tallahassee and at the Kennedy Space Center. (A designated Certified Giant Screen must be a minimum of 3,100 square feet.)

The \$2 million project climaxed with the installation of the 60-foot by 80-foot screen, which was delivered on Oct. 4 and hoisted by crane through a second floor window at the museum on Oct. 6. About 20 people assisted.

New equipment equals more movies. Cavendish said that MODS will be showing at least three new documentaries each year and one to two dozen Hollywood films, starting with "Dracula Untold," which opened at the theater on Oct. 9.

"I think that (people will) realize that this continues to be the best place in South Florida to see a movie," she said. Cavendish, a self-proclaimed movie buff, looks forward to an even better movie experience. "I remember when I saw 'Avatar' – I came out of the theater thinking I just had an adventure myself."

The adventures continue with the release of "Interstellar," which begins showing in 15/70 large format on Nov. 4, two days before the film opens nationwide. 1

¿Qué Tal? What's Up? Classes for Language Learners at the Library, That's What.

sually the library is a quiet zone, but on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, the Broward County Main Library becomes a meeting place for conversation. On a recent Wednesday in October, Helene Palmer, supervisor of the reference and circulating books section, led Crossroads Café, an English conversation class. Three students in their 20s, two Italians and an individual from Haiti, joined her.

"The main library has been undergoing construction for three years now so our attendance has dwindled. People are finding it difficult to find their way into the library and their way back out," Palmer said, "but now we're really hoping to bring customers back. Currently, we have small groups, generally around five people each week. We want to have more."

The Broward County Main Library's relaunch is scheduled for Dec. 13 so Palmer is also optimistic about getting more volunteers, who usually lead the classes.

On this particular day, Palmer showed students a 30-minute video about elections. It's part of a 26-segment series that teaches









English conversation skills. After they watched the episode, she helped the students practice speaking aloud and writing in English.

Tucked away in libraries across Broward County, both English and Spanish classes are offered for residents looking to brush up on their English skills or learn Spanish as a second language. The county's library learning services offer free, weekly classes at the majority of Broward library locations.

Two of the most popular offerings are the English Café (English language) and El Club (conversational Spanish) classes. Crossroads Café began in 1998, while English Café was started as a spin-off version for students who wanted English conversation practice without the video component.

Vonda Bryant, who is in charge of the library learning services office, said that throughout the years the classes have been a success. Over the past quarter, 21 locations reported attendance, although 23 locations in total hosted classes.

"We've offered classes for the last 14 years," Bryant said. "We

English Café aims to teach English to students who speak other languages. The class focuses on conversation, writing, reading and pronunciation skills.

Instructor Robert Patchen started teaching an English Café class seven years ago and plans to keep instructing. "I generally work with people who have little English training from other schools or countries," Patchen said. "My goal is to improve their skills and focus more on American English."

Patchen usually sees about five students a week and hopes to increase the student turnout for future classes.

"Sometimes it's upsetting that I have little to no students some weeks, but I'm still hanging in there," Patchen said. "The classes are really helpful, and I would love to have more students."

El Club, offered at 10 libraries in Broward, is a conversational Spanish class designed to motivate students to speak the language without feeling uncomfortable or shy. Eight locations reported attendance this last quarter.

Doris Reynaga has instructed an El Club class every week since 2009. "My main job is to be a motivator and encourage them to talk and answer questions," Reynaga said. "It's all about conversation."

According to Reynaga, every student has the same chance to succeed no matter what level of Spanish they are on. Lisa Martin is a student of Reynaga's and religiously attends the weekly class.

"It's really helpful because I have someone who will correct me as I speak. My friends don't always do that," Martin said. "I've been in the class for the last nine months and I definitely plan to continue."

El Club is not just confined to a classroom. Martin explained that once in a while the class will go to a restaurant to practice their skills in a real-life setting. Last

June, four El Club students joined Reynaga on a trip to Lima, Peru. The students rented an apartment together and stayed for 10 days.

"Most of my students really have an interest in becoming involved with what they are learning," Reynaga said.


The language classes offer a laundry list of benefits for students – whether it be mastering a second language for personal or employment reasons or getting involved with a fun, weekly activity at the local library.

"South Florida is such a multicultural area and we have so many newcomers that arrive in Florida all the time and they need an opportunity to find a nonthreatening, informal, casual way to practice speaking English. 

The Scoop

More than 75 percent of the boating population in Fort Lauderdale is classified as privately owned. And according to Kathy Keleher, marketing and parade director of the Seminole Hard Rock Winterfest Boat Parade, the idea behind the 2014 Winterfest motif was to provide a parade theme that is broad, yet still unique enough to engender participation. This year, Winterfest celebrates TV's greatest hits. (Think "Dr. Who," "Gilligan's Island," "Frosty the Snowman.")

According to Keleher, Winterfest preparation is a year round job. Shortly before the 2013 parade even started, staff began with 2014 arrangements - it's this advanced planning that Winterfest is known for. At the 2014 International Festival and Events Association/Haas and Wilkerson

Pinnacle Awards, Winterfest came away with eight honors. "This is the first year we won so extensively," Keleher said.

Take a look at what the folks at Winterfest have been preparing for all year long.



What's New?

Broadway Across America and Cirque Du Soleil's latest touring show, "Amaluna," join forces with Winterfest as this year's partner performance organizations. Cirque du Soleil will sponsor the media only Winterfest White Party on Nov. 15.

Look out for "wow" boats, including a Motown-inspired vessel orchestrated by Broadway Across America. "'Wow' boats are the showstoppers," Keleher said. It's Winterfest's way of putting money back into the event. "The mission is to capture the hearts of (those in) the local community."

The Absolut Vodka drink contest returns for its third year – this time with a heavy social media presence. "We're extending the social media base to Instagram," Keleher said. "It used to just be sequestered to Facebook."

Bartenders can design a Winterfest-inspired cocktail that features Absolut Vodka, snap a photo and post it on their social media pages. Three weeks of online voting, which started on Oct. 17 will procure three finalists, who will go on to phase two – the mixologist tasting. 



Crafty Caps

ONE MAN'S TRASH IS THE SAME MAN'S FLOORING

hat do you do when you pop a cap? A bottle cap that is. Some throw them away. Others hoard them for Pinterest projects. Julian Siegel fits somewhere in between. Owner of the locals' bar Riverside Market in Sailboat Bend, Siegel saved the bottle caps from the over 500 craft beers his bar serves - in his office, around the bar and in the attic – just in case he could use them someday.

"People have always mocked the fact that I save bottle caps. They didn't understand why. And I said 'There'll be a purpose. We'll cover a wall, we'll do something.' For years

we saved, saved. My wife was loosing her mind because the office was full of bottle caps."

This winter, he'll open Craft Beer Cartel, an upscale liquor store with a selection that runs the gamut. "Riverside Market prides itself on having the largest craft beer selection - 500 beers, and I thought, if I take away the convenience aspect of a convenience store and make it into a craft beer store and (offer) 1,000 beers to go, it would give me more room in Riverside so I wouldn't have so much inventory around. I would be able to sell beers to go, priced

competitively."

And he's found a spot for the 300,000 bottle caps he saved – the floor of the new

Construction started in September on a property he owns down the street from Riverside Market but had leased out for the past five years. "I wanted to do a facelift on the 7-Eleven structure from the 70s."

He vacillated between acid stained or epoxy floors and commercial flooring. The bottle cap floor project, which was at first sequestered to the bathrooms, won out. "We decided to make it a community effort and

we thought that everyone could just express themselves, especially our loyal Riverside fans."

They hosted a bottle cap laying party on Sept. 16 and since then, social media and word of mouth has generated community participation beyond expectations.

"That's how I saw it," Ronni Reinhardt said. She was on site to finish up her design. "They posted it on Facebook. I saw the picture and it said, "Come on in." Yesterday my friend and I came down. She did the "I Love Beer" and I did the dolphin and the sun."

"Someone last night loved her dolphin so

much they wrote, "Fins Up," Siegel said.


Home breweries in the community and beyond – Funky Buddha Brewery, Florida Beer Company, Cigar City Brewing, Harpoon Brewery – have marked their territory on various spots of the Craft Beer Cartel floor.

"I have to tell you that Adam Fine from Native [Brewing Co.] did the state of Florida in Florida bottle caps with all of them facing the right way," Siegel said. "I wish I could be as OCD as that."

Siegel prefers the non-specific mosaic style that results from the random fill-in in between designs. "Secretly, I like the gumball look but at the same time you can't deprive anyone of beautiful art.

My wife has done, I would say, 60 percent of the work here with our kids. Marc Wiltshire and Justin Gennaro spend every minute they're not working at Riverside over

An epoxy finish will seal over the floor and a path will be left uncapped to allow for a smooth surface for wheeling kegs into the walk-in. On the other side of the store, they'll set up a picobrewery – which is smaller than a nanobrewery – for demonstrative purposes. Home brew supplies will also be on sale.

START DROOLING

One of our favorite local cookbook authors shares a few of his cherished recipes to help you celebrate the holidays.

I love this recipe for the holidays. Florida holidays always have a twist to them. We have perfect weather year round so I use a classic ham as a way to mix things up for the holidays. Jeff is my stepfather and he is the one that gave me this oh so delicious recipe. I love a good ham so I was a skeptic as to how to make it better, but then I heard two magic words - Jack Daniel's - and I was more than willing to try this recipe. This is the perfect recipe for Florida because I can keep my oven free for other sides while the ham is outside on the grill.

Jeff's Heavenly Ham

10 to 12 pound ham.

18 ounces of Jack Daniel's Tennessee whiskey

½ cup brown sugar

½ teaspoon garlic salt

½ teaspoon cloves

½ teaspoon Louisiana hot sauce

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon

2 teaspoons finely chopped garlic

1 cup crushed pineapple with

MIX ALL INGREDIENTS

for glaze and set aside. Place ham into aluminum pan (I typically double this up). Cut deep slits across top and sides (just the width of the knife). Spoon about a 1/3 of mixture over the top and then push some of the mixture into the cuts in order to get the mixture into the ham. Pour another 1/3 of the mixture over the top and save the remained for basting the ham while it's on the grill.

PLACE THE HAM IN THE

PAN onto a grill and cook at 350 degrees for about an hour and a half to an hour and 45 minutes. Baste the ham with remaining mixture every 15 minutes. I enjoy this because I also pour myself a Jack Daniel's on the rocks and relax in between the times that I baste the ham.

Slice your ham and serve.

HINT: You or your guests may not be big fans of the edges of the ham. I save them and use them as a great starter when I make red beans and rice.

Oven Roasted Vegetable Medley

- 2 large purple onions
- 1large green bell pepper
- 1 large yellow bell pepper
- 1 large red bell pepper
- 2 green zucchinis
- 2 yellow squash
- 1 head garlic peeled
- 1 package button mushrooms
- 4 medium stalks rosemary
- 1 tablespoon Italian seasoning
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- Salt and pepper to taste

PREHEAT OVEN to 400 degrees. Cube all veggies and mix with olive oil and seasoning. Place all in large roasting pan and be sure rosemary sprigs are under veggies. Bake for 12 minutes, remove, and lower oven to 350 degrees. Stir veggies and place back in oven for additional 15 to 20 minutes depending on how well done you like your veggies.

HINT: If, and I mean if, there is any of this dish left, roast a few tomatoes and then blend them up and mix into the cooked veggies and let them simmer on the stovetop. You will have one heck of a delicious sauce for the next day!

responsible service of alcohol, but also the proper storing of all food items, especially eggs. As long as they're fresh and stored properly in the fridge at all times, then you should never have any issues.

Whatever drink it is, and whichever technique you use, every drink that contains eggs should have some sort of aroma added at the end. No egg drink should ever be left without a final aromatic flourish, in my opinion, because within a couple of minutes the drink will develop a very unappealing "eggy" smell. Something simple like a grating of nutmeg or cinnamon, a lemon twist broken over the surface, drops of bitters (such as on a Pisco Sour) or a spray of absinthe or house made tincture can work wonders.

I've included two of my favorite egg cocktails and some instruction on how to prepare some delicious recipes at home.

Sustainability in Wine

DRINK RESPONSIBLY AND SAVE THE EARTH

ustainability seems to be everywhere these days. But what is its relevance to wine, and why should it matter to you?

The definition of sustainable is:

- of, relating to, or being a method of harvesting or using a resource so that the resource is not depleted or permanently damaged; and
- of or relating to a lifestyle involving the use of sustainable methods.

For wine, sustainability can be as simple as vineyard owners and winemakers using natural products for fertilization and pest control. It means ensuring that the next crop and the crop after that are not adversely affected by what we do today. It means cleaner, and hopefully, better products.

Examples in the wine industry where sustainability is making an impact include:

- The rise of wine kegs as a means to reduce the wasting of glass, corks, labels, foils, boxes and more.
- Each keg saves 2,340 pounds of trash in its lifetime.
- Each keg reduces the carbon footprint of the same wine poured out of bottle over a 20-year period by 96 percent.



O CHECK OUT SOME WINERIES

that employ sustainable practices: Iron Horse Vineyards from Sonoma, Calif. Long Meadow Ranch in Napa Valley, Calif, Chehalem from the Willamette Valley, Ore. Raymond in Sonoma, Calif, and Saintsbury in Carneros, Calif.

- Every new keg is like taking an average car off the road for two years.
- One steel keg saves the CO2 equivalent of 28 trees.*
- Many wineries are using lighter glass bottles. Lighter glass means less shipping weight, which means greater fuel efficiency and less waste.
 - In the Pacific Northwest, wineries are practicing "Salmon Safe" farming. They won't use chemicals or other products that could damage one of their great resources salmon.
 - In Fort Lauderdale, we have a couple of restaurants that are focusing on sustainability. There are certainly many more, but Fork and Balls as well as Captain and Nico are operating kegs and utilizing as many sustainable products as possible.

Enjoy your next glass of wine and drink sustainably, Fort Lauderdale! ①

We were fortunate to spend some time speaking with Skinner and it was extremely evident, right off the bat, that she truly does value her team and regulars and loves them like family.



duck sauce was the perfect accompaniment and paired well with the surprising kick of each bite.

Moving on to the lightly fried, whole belly Ipswich clam basket ... I will admit that these perfect bites did not last long on our table! After tasting my first one, I was hit with a melt-in-your-mouth, buttery consistency. I could not stop eating them until the very last one was gone. The basket came with a baked potato, butter and tartar sauce. While the tartar sauce was delicious, I suggest you go sans tartar for an unadulterated experience.

Next in the lineup was the lobstah roll (traditional style). Many restaurants will boast the freshness of their ingredients, but let me assure you that after one bite of this lobstah roll we instantly tasted the freshness of the lobster. The dish consisted of generous chunks of lightly mayo-ed lobster served atop shredded lettuce, and positioned on a top-cut, lightly buttered



New England style roll.

We concluded our culinary adventure with the restaurant's famous "Fishwich." Two generous, lightly breaded Boston scrod filets came served with a side of French fries (or "chips"). It was perfectly cooked, flaky and delicious.

While I was too stuffed to eat another bite, I plan on returning soon for the lobstah special (offered every Tuesday all year), which includes twin one-pound lobsters for \$20, a two-pounder for \$25 and a big-boy three pounder for \$35, all of which come served with a choice of one side.

Kelly's Landing is a lovely little piece of New England located right here in Fort Lauderdale!

How did you create your Las Olas concept?

Summa: Our partner, Todd Herbst (of Big Time Restaurant Group), had this vision incubating for a while. His dream of opening a great Italian neighborhood restaurant is really what fueled this project. Las Olas Boulevard has a great vibe, and we love being part of the community. The specifics of what we're going to do, and the whole concept of the food has evolved through testing dishes in our kitchen and design meetings. We eat a lot!

Bossi: I have always been interested in Italian food since my heritage comes from Sicily and I have always dreamt of having an Italian restaurant where all of the dishes are made from scratch. Together with my partners, Lisabet and Todd, we have created Louie Bossi's, which will offer artisan cured meats, fresh pastas, traditional Neapolitan pizza, house made desserts, and an in-house barista. The space will boast old world Italian design and an outdoor piazza.

What trend excites you most in reference to today's culinary scene?

Summa: The fact that a lot of the great things happening in the food world have nothing to do with today! What excites me are old ways and artisan methods. Preserving traditions of training apprenticestyle craftsmen, living closer to the land, the proliferation of green markets, and the green ethos for living. Bringing back heritage seeds and producing fruits and vegetables that haven't been commercially grown in the United States for decades. Everything old is new again. Baking breads with natural fermentation and long slow rises, canning, jam making and pickling. You have to have these skills to deal with seasonal bumper

Bossi: Right now, my favorite culinary trend is nose-to-tail/root-to-stalk cooking (i.e., reduce food waste by using entire animal/plant). I have incorporated this old world tradition into our charcuterie program at my current restaurant Big City Tavern.

Who inspires you?

Summa: The people I love ... my family, my husband, my friends, people I work around and with, my partners and our staff at Big Time. It's an amazing group. There are a lot of us, but so many wonderfully gifted people who are really passionate about the hospitality business. I was mesmerized by reading Dan Barber's "The Third Plate" and the writings of Peter Mathieson, the novelist and naturalist. These men are amazing and both move me particularly in regards to our role in the safe keeping of our precious and expendable natural resources.

Bossi: Each day I wake up thankful for my family. They are my biggest inspiration and they have sacrificed so much for me to be able to make my dream come true. I aspire to be the best husband I can be and set a good example to my two sons.

What is your favorite culinary memory?

Summa: Making egg salad sandwiches

Bossi: This memory is very recent. Big Time Restaurant Group just sent us to Tony Gemignani's International School of Pizza in San Francisco to learn the authentic way of making Neapolitan dough using specific Neapolitan DOP ingredients. I now have so much understanding of the history behind the Neapolitan craft that I will bring to Louie Bossi's.

Wine: Red or white?

Summa: Can't say. I love 'em both! Bossi: Growing up, red wine was always at the dinner table so I would have to say red.

What is your favorite kitchen utensil?

Summa: My French knife. I have two knives that are really essential. Beyond that, had my way I'd cook a vegetarian pasta every night! I also love very buttery scrambled eggs, if it's butter made from grass-fed cows, organic eggs, and Nico's sourdough bread toasted, with very strong Darjeeling tea. I love breakfast, even though I don't always take the time to eat it. Nico is our pastry chef at City Oyster Sushi Bar and Grill, and is our consulting pastry chef on the Louie Bossi project.

Bossi: Porchetta served with fresh pasta and garlic butter sauce. My wife and kids also love it!

What is your favorite classic craft cocktail?

Summa: Well, I love Campari, so Negronis are a natural pick for me, but I also love margaritas. Being the chef at Rocco's Tacos and Tequila Bar has opened up a whole

world of tequilas for me to try. I recently started drinking some mescals well, which are really unique, and delicious. I love a good gin and tonic with tons of fresh lime, and my mom's favorite, a Cin-Cin, which is sweet and dry vermouth, half and half, on the rocks with a slice of orange! That's one that brings back memories whenever I make it. I love that cocktails have come back. I really like some of the artisan vodkas that I've tried, especially Organic Prairie from Minnesota. There's nothing at all wrong with a simple bloody mary extra spicy! I really love to drink, I just don't do it that well, and I'm actually pretty much of a lightweight so I stick to wine. Exploring the Italian varietals for Louie Bossi Ristorante is tons of fun!

Bossi: I don't drink alcohol so I enjoy "mocktails." My favorite is Pellegrino with fresh muddled mint leaves.

Would you prefer to do a craft beer or wine themed pairing?

Summa: Probably wine, but it depends on the food. My friend Norman Van Aken used to say I drink beer when I'm thirsty, and wine when I'm dining!

Bossi: Wine because it goes best with Italian cuisine. We look forward to offering wine pairings with each course at Louie Bossi's.

What music complements your cooking style?

Summa: Southern rock and Motown! Full of jams and blues, and soulful, retro and American (sounds)! Even though I'm an armchair traveler, and a total Francophile, I'm an American chef, born and raised, schooled and taught. We get to cook all styles and ethnicities of food here and don't have to specialize!

Bossi: "The Godfather" soundtracks, because that's what I grew up with and it reminds me of my crazy Italian family.

If you weren't a chef, where would vou be today?

Summa: I'd be a gardener. But I'm going to be a gardener and a chef, soon!

Bossi: Honestly, I couldn't even begin to imagine because being a chef is my passion and dream. @
